I actually had to write long essays, go to tutorials for help, and read challenging books. Since then, approaching a challenge actually excites me. I know study methods, how to use resources, and strategies for group projects, which are all essential for college.”

Abry graduated from SMA in 2017 and is pursuing a political science degree at the University of Houston Honors College.
